

**HB 2001: General Appropriations; 2009-2010;
2010-2011**

Seventh Special Session 2010

Signed by Gov. Brewer 3/18/2010

Summary of Legislation: This legislation allocates state general fund and other fund appropriations for FY 2010-11 for the operation of state government and makes various budget revisions, transfers and supplemental appropriations for FY 2009-10. Additionally, this bill eliminates the full-day kindergarten funding (\$218 million); eliminates funding for gifted programs, teacher training, adult education and GED, and the early education block grant; reduces funding for charter schools (\$10 million); eliminates funding for regular school building and maintenance; reduces support for community colleges and universities. Furthermore, this legislation contains a contingent budget should voters fail to pass Proposition 100 – the temporary 1-cent sales tax increase. If Proposition 100 did not pass, another \$428 million would have been reduced from the Department of Education, \$13 million from community colleges, and \$107 million for state universities.

Additionally, this legislation contains a contingent fund sweep dependent upon the passage of Proposition 302—the repeal of First Things First, the 80-cent tobacco tax for early childhood development and health programs. If voters pass Proposition 302 on Nov. 2, 2010, \$40 million will be transferred from the Early Childhood Development and Health—the fund for First Things First—to the Department of Economic Security (DES) in FY 2010-2011. DES may use the monies to increase the Division of Developmental Disabilities provider rates. The balance of the First Things First reserve funds—nearly \$300 million—and future tax revenues will revert to the general fund for allocation by the legislature.

Vote Translation:

“YES” on bill = Vote to eliminate or reduce funding for various K-12, community colleges and universities, adult education, and gifted programs.

“NO” on bill = Vote to oppose elimination or reduction in funding for various K-12, community colleges and universities, adult education, and gift programs.
